1. Community Colleges in Wyoming

All seven community colleges in Wyoming have the same tuition cost set by the State of Wyoming Community College Commission. Each local board of trustees determines the fees at their college. Tuition is based on residency: in the state of Wyoming, out of the state of Wyoming, and in the 16 member states and territories surrounding Wyoming (*Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE)*). Students can attend a community college on a full-time basis (12+ credit hours per semester) or a part-time basis. Classes are offered in-person (face to face) and virtually.

There is a positive collaborative relationship between the community colleges and the University of Wyoming (UW) to ensure credits transfer from community colleges to UW. To help youth navigate the types of degrees offered for each program, check out the chart below to help with degree abbreviations.

To become aware of the programs offered and the degrees that youth can achieve, it is important to understand the degree types. An Associates Degree is a two-year degree (a total of 60 credit hours) and can generally be broken down further into three categories: Associate of Science, Associate of Applied Science, and Associate of Arts. An Associate of Science degree includes academic disciplines such as business or general science. An Associate of Applied Science contains fields such as welding and diesel technology. An Associate of Arts could include disciplines like fine arts and music. A certificate and post certificate is generally a one or two-semester program (15 to 30 credit hours). Casper College

Casper College has more than 140 academic transfer, technical, and career programs. The campus is located in Casper and consists of 28 buildings stretched across 200 acres, providing students with the big city feel without all the hassles of a big city. Casper College was established in 1945.

Casper College scholarships award about 3.5 million dollars every year to students to help recognize their achievements and provide assistance to students.

Casper T-Bird Award

Students who enroll and submit their high school transcripts and ACT scores before December 1st of each year and meet the criteria are automatically eligible to receive the T-Bird Award. The goal of this award is to recognize incoming, high-achieving freshman students.

Activity and Athletic Scholarships

Students who receive activity or athletic scholarships are selected by the coach or sponsor of each activity. Each student who receives these scholarships must maintain specific eligibility and participation, specifically a 2.0 GPA and 12 credit hours per semester.

Foundation and Alumni-Sponsored Scholarships

Northern Wyoming Community College District - Sheridan and Gillette College

The Northern Wyoming Community College District (NWCCD) includes Sheridan College, Gillette College, and Sheridan College in Johnson County. In 2020, it was ranked the 5th best community college in the nation. NWCCD offers more than 50 degree and certificate programs at their colleges.

Sheridan College

Sheridan College is located at the base of the Big Horn Mountains, with a beautiful up-to-date campus with learning opportunities and adventures in every corner. Sheridan College offers students more than \$3 million in scholarships and financial aid each year. By tying their academics to the local economy and community, they provide great agriculture programs through Diesel Technology, Welding Technology, and Machine Tool Technology. Gillette College

A High Academic Achievement Scholarship is offered by NWCCD. Students who enter college the fall semester after high school and have an ACT composite score of 25 or higher are eligible. This scholarship requires no application, but students need to be registered to receive the funds. Central Wyoming College

Central Wyoming College (CWC), located in Riverton, has outreach centers in Lander, Jackson, and Dubois. It offers certificate programs, associate's degrees, and bachelor's degrees. At CWC, students can earn a degree that takes them into the workforce or transfers them to a different college or the University of Wyoming. CWC also provides community enrichment classes, professional development, adult education, and career readiness options. CWC is home to the Wyoming PBS Station. CWC is a designated Native American Serving Non-Tribal Institution (NASNTI). It serves the largest American Indian student population of the seven community colleges in the state, about 45% of Wyoming's American Indian community college students attend CWC.


6. Career Services

Eastern Wyoming College

Eastern Wyoming College (EWC) was founded in 1948 with the main campus in Torrington. There is an additional campus in Douglas. Almost 1,937 students attend EWC for-credit courses, and 5,912 attend non-credit courses. Outreach programs are sponsored by EWC in Converse, Crook, Niobrara, Platte, and Weston Counties. EWC is the only college in the state with programs in veterinary technology and gunsmithing. The campus in Torrington covers 73 acres with 24 campus buildings. In 2017, the Career and Technical Education Center was completed and now provides premier programs in welding and joining technology, machine tooling, cosmetology, and health sciences.

Most EWC scholarships require a minimum GPA of 2.0 and half-time enrollment in the college.



Northwest College

Northwest College (NWC) is located in Powell, in the valley of the Shoshone River. It is home to the Trappers. The 124-acre campus houses 58 buildings. Northwest College first opened in 1946 with only 100 students in attendance. Initially, it was called the University of Wyoming Northwest Center from an agreement with the University of Wyoming and Park County School District No. 1, but UW support was discontinued in 1950. For 75 years, this college has combined quality academic programs, exceptional student service, and a memorable campus experience near Yellowstone National Park.

Mission Statement: In the context of our global society, the mission of Northwest College is to be student-centered; be forward-thinking; cultivate community; prepare students for transfer, career, and life; and retain and graduate students.

2. Four-Year Colleges in Wyoming

Wyoming has one public four-year university, the University of Wyoming (UW). There is also a four-year private, Catholic university, the Wyoming Catholic College. Universities typically offer four-year bachelor's degrees, six-year master's degrees, and post-graduate doctoral degrees. There generally are two categories, occasionally three for bachelor's degrees: Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts. Bachelor of Science degrees are in areas like chemistry and business. Bachelor of Arts degrees are in areas such as humanities and english. Bachelor of Fine Arts is in music or dance. Sometimes students can receive a Bachelor in Fine Arts Degree. Master's degrees are split up between four categories: Master of Arts, Master of Science, Master of Business Administration, and Master of Education. UW offers classes in person (face to face) and virtually, and students can attend full-time (12+ credit hours per semester) or part-time.

Wyoming Catholic College offers classes in person, and the program is full-time. Students earn 140 credit hours, with a set schedule of courses (no electives are offered), and graduate with a Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Arts.

For UW, tuition is based on residency: in the state of Wyoming, out of the state of Wyoming, and WUE (Western Undergraduate Exchange), which includes 16 member states and territories that surround Wyoming. (*Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE)*).



The University of Wyoming is rooted in traditions of the West and surrounded by the beautiful Rocky Mountains. UW was founded in 1886 and is nationally recognized as a land-grant research institution featuring expert staff, academics, and world-class facilities. As the only public four-year university in Wyoming, UW students can take advantage of small class sizes, support from professors, and state and local organizations. At UW, students can make lifelong connections with fellow students and staff to take their journey to the next level. In addition, UW has the largest study-abroad scholarship endowment of any U.S. four-year public land-grant university.
